- <u>Community Quilt Supply</u> Lynn Gibson
  - If you find we do not have the desired pre-cut size of batting you need for your quilt, please do make a record of the batting piece you have cut, in our book which is kept with the supplies in the Guild storage locker. We try to track how many pieces of batting we can get from a roll for community quilts.
  - Also, please ensure when you are cutting the batting, use the large tables at the entrance to the art room so that it is easy to roll out the batting. This also helps you to ensure that when you cut a piece, that the piece you cut is not irregular (one side is longer than the other). Please take the time to measure and accurately cut the batting.
  - Please check off your complete quilt(s) in our log book when you are finished making your community quilt.
- <u>Special Events</u> Kathy Oliver
  - We had a great Christmas luncheon at Parkbridge Estates on November 25<sup>th</sup>. 66 members attended the event.
  - Quilt Canada is in Edmonton in June 2024. Kathy asked how many people are considering attending and by show of hands, how many would be interested in having a bus chartered to take members to Edmonton for two days of the show.
