Reminders:

- Vi reminded the guild that if you brought stuff for the sale table and the free table to pick up any left-over items at the end of the meeting.
- Help yourself to any of the orphan blocks and make something awesome for community quilts or whatever you like
- Reminded us to get our Raffle Tickets at the table with Sandy and also the sign up sheet for the Retreat coming up
- Community Quilts – the backing and batting is provided for free. Just remember to sign up and when you return the quilt check yourself off the list.

Committee Reports:

Community Quilt Supply (Lynn Gibson)

- Members are reminded our community quilt sew day is Saturday, February 21st from 9 am until 4 pm. Please sign up if possible on the sheet on the table.
- Please bring your fabric and sewing supplies to make a quilt to be given to the Community Quilt committee for donation. Bring your lunch. Coffee and tea will be available. We have batting (50" by 60" and 60" by 70") and backing options available to complete your quilt. Please sign up with the supply committee so we know how many to set up for.
- Question was asked if there would be a pattern supplied for the quilts for the sew day. Lynn advised that they would not be providing a pattern because everyone likes to do their own thing.

Community Service (Doreen Little)

- Doreen asked that when you donate a quilt and want an email letting you know where it was donated, please provide your FULL name when dropping off the quilts. Pat will send an email to everyone who donates a quilt – if they want one.
- We were short with Dolly quilts – encouraged everyone to take an orphan block and make a dolly quilt. She showed an example.

- Questions was asked if there was a size for the dolly quilts. Orphan blocks make a good barbie quilt, but the dolly quilts should be 18" x 24" would be perfect.
- They have lots of large quilts but are in need of lap size quilts.
- December was busy as we distributed most of the quilts we have collected. We always save a few for emergencies

- **The quilt entry is up and running. You can check the guild website for the information about each category and how to enter your quilts. The entry fee can also be entered via e-transfer. Please enter one if possible.**
- I'm hoping to show 200 quilt items at our show on May 1st and 2nd . Hopefully everyone has at least one quilt they've made in the last three years that they're willing to enter. The more quilts we have to show the more successful the show will be.
- Quilt raffle tickets are still available to sell. A book of ten is \$20 and each book of ten sold earns the member an entry to win \$50. Remember to return the ticket stubs for entry into the raffle.

- Maria Craft will be looking for volunteers soon to sign up for a variety of jobs at the Quilt Show. This may be selling admission wristbands, selling raffle tickets, receiving quilts, hanging quilts, assisting vendors, etc.
- Keep in mind that proceeds from the show help fund our community quilt donations.
- Our next meeting is after executive Jan. 14th so there may be more info to share at the January Guild meeting.

Retreats & Workshops (Cherilyn Jorgenson)

- The guild committee has interest in a “Working Girl Retreat?” presently in the planning stages. More information to come.
- Bonnie Boulton announced that signups are available for the Spring Casa Retreat, March 13,14 & 15, 2026 – they have 28 signed up but have room for 32. After that your name is on the waiting list and if anyone cancels you will be notified. The cost for the retreat is \$65.00 per person

Special Events (Deb Cartwright)

The 2025 Christmas Lunch was held at the Paradise Canyon Golf Club on December 13, 2025. We sold 76 tickets and 73 people attended the lunch. One ticket was refunded due to illness.

This year the room was set nicely with the tables bunched up closer to the bar side, but still enough room to get around. There were 10 tables with seating for 8 at each table. There were additional tables for the 50/50 draw (1), Door Prizes (1), Gift Exchange (2) and Gift opening (1). There was also a cash bar for those interested.

Thanks to Barb Graham and Liz Pinches for looking after the Admission Tickets and 50/50 ticket sales. 50/50 tickets sold for \$1.00 or 3 for \$2.00. The 50/50 Draw brought in \$184.00. The winner of the 50/50 Draw received \$92.00. Considerably fewer 50/50 tickets were sold this year. Sharon Selwyn was the winner.

We had 3 vendors (Donna Kendall, Vi Knox and Barb Thomsen) who were happy to participate. They were set up in the small room behind the bar.

The guest speaker this year was Janet Alexander who gave a very interesting talk on the origins of the guild.

We selected the Sandwich Buffet as the lunch menu for this year. We asked the event manager for a detailed menu, but never did receive one. We also asked for a venue contract but were assured one was not needed. Unfortunately, not having these details, resulted in a misunderstanding regarding the cost of the lunch. Given the information I had, we assumed the buffet would be the same as last year. However, we were not aware that, this year, the soup and salads were an additional cost. The budget for the lunch was calculated on the base cost of the Sandwich Buffet and did not include the additional cost of the soup and salads. Therefore, unfortunately, we are going to be significantly over budget.

Our comments and recommendations for next year are:

1. If Paradise Canyon is chosen for next year's lunch, we will need to make a reservation soon.
2. Get a detailed breakdown of what is included in the sandwich buffet.
3. Get a written quote and a signed agreement.
4. Confirm that the coffee station will have enough supplies for the number of guests and will include coffee, tea and a selection of cold drinks.
5. Have written confirmation with the guest speaker/presenter regarding length of presentation, they need to come with their own supplies including computers and the time of their presentation.
6. We must have a policy on ticket refunds when people cannot attend.

- Square information - Mary Ann Hindle

The Square – Point of Sale equipment used for debit and credit card transactions.

- Motion was passed in the last Executive Meeting to set up the Square. While setting it up she hit a brick wall as she didn't have all the information she needed – she passed it off to Barb Thomson the treasurer as she has all the information needed to set up the account. Then we will do a trial using the square in hopes that it can be used at the quilt show.

- Question was asked about where the trial was going to be and it was hopefully going to be used at the retreat
- There are two ways to use the square. You can add an app to your phone and use it. Or you can use that actual square itself.
- Question was asked if we had purchased the square already as one had been donated. Mary Ann advised there was no cost now for the square and she will let Barb know that we have one donated.

PROGRAM (Lia Britton)

- Turtle Mop Exchange – names of those that brought a completed mops for exchange were put in a bag and drawn. They then picked a bag with a turtle mop. There were some very cute and fun turtle mops.
- Sewing Room Tour - Cindy Toone showed a power point of her new sewing room.
 - It is in the back of her garage.
 - It is 30' x 12' and very beautiful.
 - She has a sewing desk, cutting desk with storage underneath, two wing back chairs for comfort, her long arm machine and bookshelves.
 - It has two beautiful big windows for light and in one window she displays a beautiful stained glass window made by her sister-in-law. She painted everything white and it is very beautiful.
 - She said if it had a bed and a bathroom she would live back there.

- Five Methods to Improve Pressing for flatter pieced blocks
 - Kaye Borthwick – demonstrated using a tailor's clapper
 - Suggested using the clapper and a wool mat. Wool mat absorbs the heat and the clapper presses down so you don't have to use the iron and there is no scorching.
 - Press seams open or make sure your seams are pressed in the same direction
 - Watch for ditches or ridges

- Someone mentioned that Kaye's husband makes the clapper so if you are interested in one speak with Kay



- Audrey Muirhead demonstrated a doweling that her husband cut in half long ways. She uses it to press her seams open
- You can find them on Amazon (pictured below) but cheaper to cut a doweling in half.



- Gail Berkner - Showed different pressing liquids or starches:
 - Important to get your fabric flat for more accuracy before cutting
 - Home made starch – made with cornstarch and water OR Vodka and water. Someone mentioned that you need to use Vodka made with potatoes for the starch.
 - Mary Ellen's Best Press – comes in many different scents and purchased by the gallon or smaller sizes.

- Acorn Easy Press fabric treatment. Works very good. It comes in a spray and also in a applicator pen that you can run along your stitching line and then it presses flatter.

- Most quilt stores carry these products.
- Seam rollers always work good too. Lia demonstrated one that she bought at the dollar store (it was for rolling your face) but it works great for seams.



- Gail Berkner announced what we are going to do next month and the challenge.
 - UFO's – New challenge called Lethbridge Centennial Quilt Guild UFO Project.
 - Those that want to participate can take a form that has six lines on it. Go home and list six of your UFO's that you would like to complete this year.
 - If you don't have six – do three. If you have more than six – do six. 😊
 - If you don't have any – take an orphan block from the table. 😊
 - Next meeting (February) we will draw a number and that is the number you will work on that month and hopefully finish and bring it back the next month (March) to show. There are prizes involved.
 - You get six projects done by the end of the year.
 - Needs to be UFO's – for example borders, binding, finishing table runners or place mats
